Annexure-III

Analysis of Student Feedback (2015-16)

A questionnaire based on prescribed NAAC format helped us seek the views and opinions of the students. Random feedback was taken from about 300 students, a significant fraction of them belonging to 3rd year Honours students. Analysis led to the following details.

1. Curricular Aspects:

The college mandatorily follows and implements the curricula prescribed by the affiliating university viz. the University of Kalyani.

As evident from the feedback there is divergence in the opinion regarding the content or matter of the curricula. While many are satisfied with the existing course structure some feel that greater emphasis should have been given on the application side.

However there is overwhelming unanimity regarding the medium of instruction. Most of the students, particularly in science stream, feel the absence of quality text books in their mother tongue viz. Bengali language is arresting their comprehension of topics covered in the syllabus. However this difficulty is an initial one and fades with time.

2. Teaching , Learning and Evaluation:

The students in general are quite satisfied with the teaching, learning process prevalent in the campus. Students appreciate the practice of tutorial classes as well as remedial classes.

Some are perturbed at the delay in publication of results of final examination – an area which the college has nothing to do because they are conducted entirely by the university.

The feedback highlights student's eagerness to participate in seminars arranged by them where they wished the audience to be simply their classmates and the respective departmental teachers. The departments always encouraged such thinking and tried to act accordingly by complying with such feedback.

3. Infrastructural facilities:

It was evident from analysis of student feedback that library facilities should be made better. Students are quite satisfied with laboratory facilities offered by the science departments. Few students wished to get a good facility of canteens.

4. Student support and recreational facilities:

The college has multiple playgrounds and students play kabaddi, football, volleyball and other games in the playground, as well as spend leisure time in the college gardens. Students are eager to have a campus that looks attractive and vibrant.

Feedback from Parents 2015-2016

As a significant number of students are first generation learners guardians often come to the college with various queries. To address the situation, departments arrange parent-teacher meetings from time to time. Interaction with teachers satisfies the guardians as they can gauge the progress of their wards. On the other hand the teachers are also benefitted from such interaction as they can gauge their strong points and weak points. Teachers remodel the topics of study, arrange for tutorial class, remedial classes accordingly.

Feedback from Employers 2016-2017

The Governing Body is the employing authority of the college, consisting of twelve members, four of which are teacher representatives, two non-teaching representatives, one student representative and the college Principal acts as Secretary of the Governing Body. Also there is one representative of the Government and two representatives of the affiliating university. These members uphold the points of view and feedback of the Government as well as the university in the Governing body meeting. Also the internal members give feedback of the college staff and students in the meeting. The President, who is an eminent and knowledgeable person, presides over the meeting. After discussion resolutions are taken, recorded and implemented by the Principal of the college.

Annexure-IV

Best Practices

• Organisation of digital lessons for villagers

The NSS unit of the college launched a 10 day awareness programme amongst residents, mostly labourers belonging to the BPL category living 5 villages under Babla gram panchayat area, around 10 k from the college. They were made aware of proper use of debit cards, process of checking bank accounts and how to make digital transaction. These effort of spreading financial literacy has been highly acclaimed and well covered in newspapers.

• Honest efforts to reduce school drop-outs

A group of 40 college students surveyed and consequently identified school drop outs of 6 high schools last year from the school authorities in the Santipur rural area. A camp was subsequently organised in June and students went to the concerned homes and tried to convince the families of school drop outs about the ill effects of turning away from the main stream. The varied reasons of the drop outs and discontinuance of studies were identified and brought to the notice of the relevant authorities. The effort of the NSS unit of the college was highly appreciated by all and sundry including the Sarva Siksha Mission in Nadia as well as the university of Kalyani. The initiative taken was well covered by the news papers also. We have succeeded in bringing back 4 of the 12 high school drop outs as per record.

• Research work and academic activity

A significant section of teachers are involved in active research in their topic of interest. Some of the teachers of the faculty take classes in nearby universities and keep themselves abreast of latest developments and recent trends.

• Holding Seminars

Apart from student seminars the college arranges seminars by inviting eminent personalities from universities and other institutes for delivering talks. The seminars are well attended and the students and teachers are greatly benefitted from listening to the speeches. They also get the rare opportunity of interaction with established personalities.

• Wall Magazine

Various Departments run Wall Magazines by students of their Department.

• On line admission

To ensure transparency and clarity the college introduced online admission. The college is determined to follow them in the years to come.

• Cleanliness of college campus

Our college has plenty of space and efforts are taken to keep the campus clean, beautiful and pollution free.

• Smoking free zone

The college is made a non- smoking zone and students are made aware of the deleterious effects of smoking.
